Punatapu/Bob's Cove

An area of botanical significance.



Walk the Bob's Cove Bridle Track to see a fragmented snapshot of the original, pre-European vegetation that likely cloaked the shores of Whakatipu-wai-Māori. Human interventions, including burning to make way for grazing, have left only small remnants of these ancient forests

Plants do not grow in silos; they form communities that interact with one another and other organisms. The Bob's Cove plant community is a mixture of beech, podocarp and broadleaf shrubs and trees. The location and growth of specific plants within this community is determined by rainfall, temperature gradients, soil, relief and natural disturbances.

Podocarp species hark back to the ancient Gondwana continent that this land was once a part of, and this area marks the eastern limit for these types of trees, which need a lot of moisture to grow. Close to the lake edge, the track passes through one of the Whakatipu's last remaining mature stands of red beech, while mountain beech dominates the upper, cooler slopes of the track.

Southern rātā can be seen on the rocky outcrops where there is plenty of light but only a thin layer of soil. A variety of small-leaved trees grow in the shade below the canopy, sheltered from the sun. Spot the mataī, one of Aotearoa's forest giants. It's rare in this area and Bob's Cove is home to a few of the remaining handful in the Whakatipu basin.


